The NRHS Fund Trustees have been meeting quarterly. The last meeting of the NRHS Fund Board was held via Zoom on Friday, April 24, 2026. The next meeting the NRHS Fund Board will be held as Zoom meeting on July 24, 2026.

As of May 8, 2026, the Wells Fargo Advisors investment portfolio was valued at \$1,474,157. The Wells Fargo Checking account was \$73,017.

Year to date as of May 8, 2026, the investment account has produced 4.21% investment growth. Since inception in March 2020 the account has produced a growth of 9.94%.

The NRHS Fund is anticipating two transfers to the NRHS within the next three months. Approximately \$157,000 for the 2026 Heritage Grants program and \$13,000 for the RailCamp program.

The NRHS Fund has a new Comptroller, Christopher Buckley. He takes over from Kevin Feeney.

The NRHS Fund has not received any major donations in 2026.

Information for the 2025 audit will be supplied to Bowers when requested by the auditors.

The NRHS Fund is seeking in coordination with the NRHS a person that can approach Foundations, Trusts and Railroads for grants.

## Report #5

### REPORT TO THE ADVISORY COUNCIL AND BOARD OF DIRECTORS, NRHS

The 2026 Edition of the *Directory of Rail Attractions for NRHS Members* has been completed and sent in for publication. This marks the 26th year that Shirley and I have produced this document. The Directory, this year, contains over 155 attractions, located in 43 states. The list began as a Discount List for NRHS members, but the Board of Directors decided to allow the listing of an attraction, whether or not they offered NRHS Members a discount. This year, over 60% of the attractions, are either free museums or offer a discount to NRHS Members. By listing all attractions that respond to our letter, offers the benefit of letting our members know that there are railroad attractions out there, that they might not be aware of, plus the opportunity to distribute more Brochures.

Six years ago, we began asking attractions if they would display our NRHS Brochure. If they responded positively, Jon Bakke would send them the number that they desired. Over the 6-year period, the Society has more than doubled the number of Brochures sent out. This year, 84 of the attractions asked for over 7,000 brochures. Many of the attractions that did not order Brochures, this year, had ordered a large-number last year.

## **Report #6**

### **REPORT OF HISTORIC PLAQUE COMMITTEE—May 2026**

**Although no new plaques have been dedicated since the last Board of Directors meeting, the Committee has been working with sponsors interested in obtaining NRHS plaques.**

**As in the past, several organizations lost interest after the process and costs involved were explained to them. At present we have three “live” candidates:**

- (1) The Roanoke Chapter is considering a plaque for the former Virginian Railway station in Roanoke.**
- (2) The Susquehanna Valley Chapter is considering a plaque for the former Lackawanna Railroad passenger station in Binghamton, NY.**
- (3) The Williams Grove Historical Association in Mechanicsburg, PA, is interested in a plaque to observe the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary of their former PRR B4a (0-6-0) locomotive which is operational. They are considering the station building or engine house as potential plaque sites.**

### NRHS Preservation Award Committee

The Outstanding Railroad Historic Preservation Award was conceived as an annual program to recognize a common carrier railroad for its historic preservation efforts. We reasoned that there isn't a compelling business case for railroad companies to invest in preserving their history – and when preservation is undertaken, NRHS should celebrate those accomplishments.

This award honors *only* common carrier railroads that have completed significant preservation projects. Railroad museums, scenic railroads and preservation societies are not eligible for this award, because they are served by the long-running NRHS Heritage Grants program.

The 2026 award will be presented in a brief ceremony at the Railway Interchange trade show in Omaha on June 3. The honoree will be publicized immediately thereafter. Although Railway Age Editor William Vanutono is retiring at the end of the year, we have been assured that the magazine will continue partnering with us on this important NRHS initiative. Railway Track & Structures, however, has stepped back.

In addition to Bill Vantuono, NRHS members R. Victor Varney, Edward M. Berntsen, Larry Pearlman, Tony White, and Mike Yuhas comprise the preservation award committee. We gratefully acknowledge the support of Dawn Holmberg for help in publishing the nomination forms on our website, and the enthusiasm of NRHS members who submitted nominations.

#### Previous honorees

2023 – Iowa Traction Railway, in recognition of their daily use of century-old electric locomotives and infrastructure

2024 – Union Pacific Railroad, recognizing the railroad's preservation and operation of historic steam and diesel locomotives to promote the railroad's heritage

2025 – Reading & Northern, honoring their use of steam engines and other historic equipment for public excursions
