

The 2023 contest theme is "Icons in Railroading". "Icons could be entirely vintage or mixed with modern elements." says Jeff Smith, NRHS Bulletin editor and head of the photo contest committee. "An icon is a person or thing regarded as a representative symbol or is worthy of veneration. Icons exist all over the railroad landscape. For instance, a modern locomotive passing an iconic station or Grand Central Terminal in New York City being used by modern commuter trains would be considered Icons of Railroading."

Photographs can be taken recently or decades ago as icons transcend time. Please submit no more than three high-resolution images (3,000 pixels on the longest edge). Fall 2022 Conference - Springdale, Arkansas - Highlights

Friday, September 23 - Sunday, September 25

Friday's activities centered around a train ride on the Arkansas & Missouri (A&M). Delegates rode in a restored dome car and rear platform car on the regularly-scheduled Springdale to Van Buren trip behind a pair of Alco C420s. At Van Buren, there was a quick motor coach ride to Fort Smith for lunch and visits to the Fort Smith Museum of History and the Fort Smith Trolley Museum, the latter of which included trolley rides on a restored 1919 Birney. The bus brought the crowd back to Van Buren for the train ride back to Springdale.

After arrival at Springdale, those who wished to tour the A&M's engine facility had the run of the place, seeing 50+ year old Alco Centuries mingling with modern EMD SD70ACes. On Friday evening, back at the hotel, the meeting of the NRHS Fund took place.

Saturday was a day of meetings. The Advisory Council met in the morning and the Board of Directors met in the afternoon. The evening banquet featured an informative presentation by local historian (and president of the Arkansas-Boston Mountains Chapter) Mike Sypult, who spoke on the history of northwest Arkansas railroads.

Sunday found the delegates onboard the "rare-mileage" trip from Springdale to Monett, Missouri and return. Lunch was served aboard the train and three photo runbys were held.

And still, in 2022, the car is going strong, its time in service to the museum far surpassing its original 14-year tenure on the system for which it was built.

2022 NRHS Autumn Conference - Report

The NRHS Autumn Conference was held in Springdale, Arkansas September 23rd to 25th, at the Holiday Inn, co-hosted by the Arkansas-Boston Mountain Chapter and the Arkansas & Missouri Railroad. The conference was attended by forty-three members.

Friday, September 23 - Sunday, September 25

Most people arrived on September 22nd. The following day *September 23rd*, the rear two cars of a regular Arkansas and Missouri train bound for Van Buren were reserved for us. It was a real treat having the ability to enjoy the ambience and rear platform of parlor car "Explorer" and the dome "Silver Feather". (See histories at the end of this report.) Light snacks and refreshments were complimentary throughout the day.

On arrival at Van Buren, we boarded a bus for the drive to Fort Smith where after a boxed lunch at the Fort Smith History Museum, passengers could either take the Fort Smith Light and Power Trolley down to the Fort Smith Trolley Museum or walk down. There was plenty of time to wander the grounds, take pictures, ride the trolley on its full route and stop in at the gift shop. A very enjoyable visit. The motor coach took us back to Van Buren and everyone had a good train trip back to Springdale.

Here we were given a tour of the J.R. McCarren Locomotive Shop and were able to take pictures of the motive power both in and outside the shop. The rare T-6s, and a mixture of Alco and General Electric motive power were readily photographable.

Saturday, September 24th started with the Advisory Council Meeting. 13 representatives were in attendance and about 30 joined remotely. Richard Shulby, representative for both the Baltimore Chapter and Piedmont & North Carolina Chapter, was unanimously elected as Chairman and I was unanimously elected as Secretary; a position in which I had been acting since November 2021.

The main outcomes resulting from the meeting were:

- a) A committee has been established to assist the Film Library to strengthen their process and give more support as the current two-person group is very limited in manpower.
- b) The 2023 spring conference in Sparks will have the NRHS Board and Advisory Council meetings occurring on May 21st, the final day of the convention. Hotel is the Nugget Hotel and Casino, \$99/night Monday to Thursday and \$129 Friday and Saturday.
- c) If the Board meets at any other time apart from during conventions and conferences (in person or virtual), the Advisory Council will meet beforehand on the same day
- d) A Chapter Communications/Engagement Committee was formed to continue communication between the Chapters and National, keep representative information (and website chapter information) up-to-date and to work with those chapters who do not have a representative. I and five others volunteered to be part of that committee.

The Board meeting took up the majority of the afternoon, with Tony White being officially announced as the new President. He named Frank Cornelius as Vice President. The new board, as a result of the recent election are: Ellen Scott (also the National Secretary), Carol Ann Cornelius (also the Assistant Treasurer) and they are joined by Eric Fogg, Skip Waters, John Goodman, Kevin Feeney, Bob Bitzer, Scott Andes and Charles Webb.


That evening was the banquet with the President of the host Arkansas-Boston Mountains Chapter giving a presentation on the history of railroads in Northwest Arkansas.

Sunday, September 25th was not an official conference event but was a rare mileage trip to Monett, Missouri; most members participated in this. Again, we had the same two passenger cars as Friday.

There were five photo runby opportunities in three locations. A good lunch of pulled pork sandwich, choice of coleslaw or crisps, refreshments and apple pie for dessert was enjoyed by all. This was a very nice way to end the conference.

Notes on the A&M passenger cars: "Explorer" was built by Pullman Standard in 1955 as Long Island P72 coach 2927. This car went to the Northern Central Railway in Pennsylvania before being moved to the Arkansas and Missouri Railroad in December 2004.

Arkansas and Missouri dome "Silver Feather" built by Budd in 1948 as Western Pacific dome-coach 812. When retired it went into Auto Train service becoming 461. In the 1980's, it served on Texas Southern before turning into Washington Central 151, and in 1997 it moved to BC Rail and their Pacific Starlight Dinner Train but became "Moonglow". It was sold to Ontario Northland and renumbered 901. In December 2010 the car was sold to Arkansas and Missouri, numbered 108 and renamed "Silver Feather".

LOUIS - SAN FRANCISCO 2-8-2 4003 - Built by American Locomotive Company in 1919 for the Pennsylvania Railroad but they rejected it and the United States Railway Administration assigned it to the St. Louis-San Francisco Railroad. 4003 was retired in early 1952. The Frisco kept the locomotive until 1954 when it was donated to the City of Fort Smith and placed on display in Kay Rodgers Park. It remained there for almost fifty years until 2002, when the city transferred ownership to the Fort Smith Trolley Museum.

Yes, the NRHS is still operating our twice-yearly conferences for the Board of Directors and the Advisory Council to conduct the business of the Society and allow us to get together for some rail activities and socialize. Our meetings are normally held in Spring (April-May) and again in the Fall (September-November).

Where are we going in 2023? The Spring meeting is a joint operation with the R&LHS and the SPRHC in Sparks, NV on May 16-21 as part of their convention. Information is available on our website and registration is open. The Fall meeting will be part of the NRHS Convention to be held in Fort Lauderdale/Deerfield Beach, FL from September 1-6, 2023.

Putting on my NRHS Conference Coordinator's Hat, I regret to report that we have no conference sites available after the scheduled one in Florida. The Society relies on the support of the chapters to host NRHS Fall and Spring Conferences. Most of the important business that takes place is done at these conferences which are held for meetings of the NRHS Board of Directors, NRHS Advisory Council and the NRHS Fund Board of Trustees.

How can the chapters help? Give serious thought to hosting a Spring or Fall conference. It's really not that hard. It will result in the satisfaction of helping the Society and giving our members the opportunity to experience your local rail scene, its culture and history. Look at your area and you will be amazed with how much there is available to offer visitors. You may have a museum, operated by the chapter or another historical group, have local or regional railroads that can operate excursions, be part an annual festival event for your area, have an important historical rail or related event which could be tied to a conference, have knowledgeable historians or railroad officials who can be guest speakers, etc.

Remember that conferences are normally only three days in length. It is not an extensive time commitment. Our normal schedule is Thursday for check-in and an evening visual program, Friday is a rail-related event, NRHS Fund meeting (evening) and Saturday is for NRHS Council and Board business meetings, and as an option an evening banquet with speaker.

If you are ready to sign-up to run a conference, or have questions and wish to discuss operating one, we want to hear from you. The Society will provide full instructions and support. We have a handbook that will be provided and a crew of knowledgeable folks who can walk you through the entire process of running a conference.

NRHS Help Wanted - Assistant Treasurer

The NRHS financial management team needs your help. Our Current NRHS Assistant Treasurer has found it necessary to resign from her position for personal reasons. With the volume of financial transactions which the Society is required to process, this is an important and critical job. It cannot be handled by one individual (Treasurer) with no back-up. Control and reporting of the Society's finances is an extremely important job in the Society. It must be done in a timely and accurate manner.

What type of background and experience is needed to be an Assistant Treasurer of a non-profit volunteer organization? Let's begin with a brief definition and overview of what the Society's Assistant Treasurer's requirements and duties for the job are:

- 1. Needs formal training and knowledge of practical business accounting skills.
- 2. Practical business work experience in accounting to manage bill payments, bank account balancing, spreadsheet preparation etc.
- 3. Needs to be familiar and work with QuickBooks PRO on-line accounting software.
- 4. Ability to work with NRHS outside CPA firm to provide information for annual audits and tax return preparation (990's).
- 5. Work with NEON Membership System financial transactions and reports.
- 6. Assist NRHS Convention Committee on financial controls of bill payments and registration/ticket sales.

Before everyone asks how many hours a week, conference calls and travel is involved, let me assure you it is not that difficult. All of the Society's accounting is done through QuickBooks and is on-line through a cloud server. If financial business meetings are required, they are often done by conference calls or using internet on-line services such as "Go To Meeting" or "Zoom".

Heritage Grant Report – Susquehanna Valley Railway Historical Society

SVRHS Grant Report Susquehanna Valley Railway Historical Society Chapter Archives

Dedicated funds for the project since inception in 2018 came from four major sources.

As noted in the Application submitted in January 2020, SVRHS had already allocated an Archival Fund basis of \$4,000.

This was supplemented over the course of the project by a \$2,000 grant from the Syracuse, NY-based Pomeroy Foundation and proceeds from the National Media's 2019 "Giving Tuesday" program (\$505.00).

The \$2,500 donation received from the NRHS Heritage Grant Program in 2020 brought the total support for the project to \$9,005.00.

Expenditures on the Archives Room Development Project through the end of 2021 were \$9,549.93. The excess was paid from authorized transfer of funds from the General Account, as needed.

Since the "Pandemic" began in the Spring of 2020, the Society lost many months that would have seen meetings, however during the "down" time there were virtually no expenditures from the General Fund, and only sporadic limited efforts at Archive Room Development by the volunteer membership, resulting in only \$702.82 spent in 2020 and \$513.24 in 2021.

Along the way, when virtually no activities were undertaken due to the COVID restrictions, members were generous in donations to the Society's programs. Also when restrictions relaxed, we were able to host public events under minimums of social distancing and wearing of masks, such that recent income including periodic fundraisers has restored our basic Archives Room Development fund to about \$9,000.

As the project arrived at basic completion near the end of 2019, and received enhancements when possible in 2020 and 2021, we are now on the verge of final completion to the extent authorized to date by our Board of Managers.

The Susquehanna Valley Railway Historical Society gratefully acknowledges the \$2,500 Heritage Grant awarded to the organization in July 2020. In accordance with the terms and conditions of the receipt of the grant, we hereby submit the enclosed report of the expenditure of the awarded funds.

Attached is a summary of the progress and improvements we made to the space we obtained in the Kilmer Building to store our archival material.

The included photo displays illustrate the success we achieved in converting a former empty storage space in the basement of the Kilmer Building into an attractive place for storage of many of our larger railroad-related items, including a signal tower with operative lights, an actual locomotive bell and a mock station-agent's office and display and storage locations for many perishable publications and related items. The contrast with the original condition of the room is striking.

While a portion of the funds were used to reimburse previously occurred expenses, the report illustrates that there are approved plans to complete the project using remaining available funds.

On behalf of the Society, we convey our heartfelt gratitude for the financial support of this project provided by the NRHS.





ONE OF A KIND INTERACTIVE EXHIBIT OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

Located in downtown Harrisburg at the corner of 7th and Walnut Streets (across from The Forum), Harris Tower Railroad Museum will be open for visits on March 11, 2023. The Museum is a railroad control tower built by the Pennsylvania Railroad in 1929 to control all train movements through downtown Harrisburg, PA. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the tower once controlled the switches and signals that routed more than 100 passenger trains a day through the Central Pennsylvania area. The tower was used by the PRR, the Penn Central Railroad and Amtrak until closing in 1991. Upon closing, the Harrisburg Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society purchased the building and began the process of restoration. Following an extensive restoration project spanning more than 15 years and thousands of dollars and volunteer hours, Harris Tower opened to the public as a living history, interpretive rail museum in 2008. The centerpiece of the exhibit is the tower's Interlocking Machine and Model Board, both of which are fully operable. Visitors to Harris Tower can actually operate the levers of the Interlocking Machine and observe the illuminated model board and follow the simulated train movements, exactly as it was done decades ago. The Interlocking Machine and Model Board have been linked to a computer simulation that is programmed with the actual Pennsylvania Railroad train schedules from the early 1940's. It is then up to the visitor to throw the proper levers to route the trains to their correct destinations. In this way, rather than simply viewing a static display, visitors to Harris Tower can actually operate the equipment and experience for themselves what it would have been like to work for the Pennsylvania Railroad in its heyday. To the best of our knowledge, there is no other exhibit like Harris Railroad Switch Tower anywhere in the world.

The tower lies adjacent to very active railroad lines, making Harris a perfect vantage point for youngsters and railroad buffs to view and photograph numerous Norfolk Southern and Amtrak trains each day from a safe location, regardless of the weather. Admission is free, but donations to benefit the Chapter's educational programs and on-going preservation initiatives are welcome. Souvenir T-shirts, coffee mugs, railroad prints and other items are sold at the tower to benefit the chapter. From the train show at the Scottish Rite Entertainment Complex, return to Division Street and turn right. Proceed to N. Seventh Street and turn right. Continue on N. Seventh to the next traffic light at Maclay St. and turn left. Proceed to next light and turn right on N. Cameron (Burger King on the right). Continue approximately one mile to Market Street and turn right. Immediately after the next overhead bridge (railroad), turn right on Fifth St., then right at the light on Walnut. Harris Tower is directly ahead; the parking lot is just past the Tower on the right. When you are ready to leave, turn right from the parking lot to exit.
